BARN FINDS

Dino buried in a Los Angeles yard

In December 1974, a California man reported his two-month old Ferrari Dino 246GTS stolen. According to the police report, the car had vanished without a trace – and, because the story checked out, the owner claimed the insurance money.

Some four years later, two boys playing in the dirt in their backyard hit something metallic. Further digging revealed a car roof and, when the police arrived, the missing Dino was exhumed – and it was remarkably well-preserved, all things considered.

The car's next owner restored it and it's still on the road today, wearing a vanity plate that reads DUG UP – no joke.



Dodge Charger Daytona in an Alabama barn

When car restorer Charlie Lyons visited Glenwood, Alabama, with a view to buying a 1970 Chevelle, the last thing he expected to come across was a rare 1969 Dodge Charger Daytona – a car developed to win NASCAR races and built to the tune of just 503 examples.

Porsche 901 in a Brandenburg barn

Porche's 911 might have been called the 901 had it not been for a copyright complaint by Peugeot. So it was that the Stuttgart legend became the 911 – but not before 82 were built with 901 designation in 1964.

None were officially sold to the public and they're so rare that even the Porsche factory didn't have one in its collection.





Ferrari 166MM in the Arizona sun

One of the earliest Ferrari models – and arguably the car that made Ferrari – this 1950 Ferrari 166MM Barchetta started out in Europe as one of only 25 built.

A man called Reg Lee Litton reportedly asked a friend to buy the car for him and had it shipped out to California. Alas, at some point thereafter something broke, so the Barchetta was laid up in his yard and left open to the Arizona elements for decades.

Eventually the 166MM was discovered and sold – but by then the seller was clued up, so California-based Manny Del Arroz paid more than US\$1m for it, even in its barn-find state.

Land-Rover #1

'JUE477' isn't quite the first ever Land-Rover – a prototype and 48 pre-production models pre-date it – but it is the first one intended for public consumption and is therefore a pivotal vehicle in the Landie story.

It was very nearly lost to history, though, having been rescued from its resting place in a Northumberland barn a few years ago.

'Juey' changed hands in late 2017, following its recovery, and despite appearances will be put back on the highway.



50 RVIL

1963 DB4 Convertible discovered

Arguably one of the most beautiful cars of all time, the Touring-styled DB4 launched in 1958 and set the tone for Aston Martin machines for the next 25 years.

Conventionally available as a coupé, just 70 were built in convertible guise – including the 1963 example unearthed at the start of this decade

Sole-surviving WO Bentley 4½ Litre Vanden Plas Tourer

It was auctioned by H&H Classics in March 2019 and fetched an impressive £454,250 – which is all the more remarkable when you consider that the previous time it had been sold it had gone for the princely sum of £260!





Lightweight E-type lost then found

When, in 1998, Jaguar specialist Terry Larson heard rumours about an alloy-bodied E-type coming out of the estate of renowned pilot Howard Gidovlenko – the 'Mad Russian' – he jumped on the first plane to LA.

Buried beneath boxes and household junk in a lockup Larson found one of the rarest E-types, the last missing Lightweight example – chassis S850660, the third built and raced at Sebring in 1963.

Gidovlenko had begun preparing it to race in 1964 but never finished, and its engine and gearbox had been removed and rebuilt, while the owner's old helmet and even the original bill of sale were with the car. It sold at auction in 2003 for \$1.3m.

PLAYING WITH OLD CARS

I started to take an interest in cars at about 15 with 2 mates { John Reid & Lee Holder) who I started school with. Our main interest back then was Hot Rods as an older person who lived not far from us was building a 1934 channelled ford coupe with motor cycle guards, this was very early in Australian hot rodding. We first managed to get an old Triumph motor bike engine to play with, next we managed to get a side valve V8 motor off a stock car racer Bill Johnson who had heaps of motors laying around.

Our next project was an unregistered 1936 Ford sedan, it cost us 10 pound 2 pound 10 shillings each as another mate came on the scene, we were not planning on registering this when we brought it, but 2 mates who were 6 month s older than the other 2 decided they wanted to get it registered, so they brought our shares out & managed to get it registered. Later on Lee & myself brought a 1927 Rugby Durant for 15 pound with 6 months rego on it, so for the next 6 months we had a lot of fun in that car, I sold my share to Lee & he put a side valve V8 in it. I then brought a 1934 Ford sedan for 30 pound it was a very good car, wish I still had it, I sold it a couple of years later for 50 pound (the car is still on the road) & updated to a 1946 Ford Deluxe which I ended up writing it off.

My next car was a 1957 Ford Customline a beautiful car. I thrashed it & it never let me down. One time we were coming home from Wollongong, going up Mount Ousley when an FB Holden panel van came down the road sideways straight into the front of it, it broke the Holden in 2, while we were waiting for the tow truck a Japanese sports car came flying around the corner missed my mates 1939 Convertable Coupe & ran into the back of my car. both cars were written off mine was the only one repaired with a full spray job. I also had another 1934 Ford sedan that I was in the process of hot rodding, after several years of sitting around not doing anything with it I sold it & brought a coloured TV for \$700, that was it young family no more cars ha ha.

6 months later 2 of my mates showed up with a 1956 Ford Customline 90,000 Miles one owner lady who lived at Cronulla, got caught in the rain once & lost control of it was never driven in the rain after that, it was a beautiful straight car & I could not resist it, sold my ZC Fairlane & bought it, bought a daily driver Morris 1100 for Jan to drive. I took this car to Sawtell when we bought a Butcher Shop but it was sitting under a Carport getting salt spray over it so we sold it, no more cars.

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I had a casual butcher who used to work for me who was in the Coffs Harbour Vintage car club & the desire came back, I bought a 1928 Ford Model a Roadster and later a 1936 Ford Phaeton which came to Ballina when we moved.

Since moving to Ballina we have owned 1957 Ford Customline, 1953 Ford Crestline Victoria, & currently have a 1956 Ford Fairlane Victoria a 1932 Ford 3 window Ford Coupe Hot rod. This does not include several Classic Harley Davidson motor bikes.

CLUB PLATES PLANNED CHANGES

As members will be aware, our club hosted the Department of Transport when they visited the region and ran talks on the Club Plates Scheme and provided answers to questions from the floor about specific issues and complying with the rules.

They did say they felt our club was complying with the requirements better than many clubs around the state which is a compliment to our Club Plates Registrar Santo. One issue that arose for Santo was the requirement that the cars are original and he has been signing his approval but was not sighting the cars individually. Our Club's requirement for a Pink Slip only really tests the cars safety and road worthiness but not its originality.


As a result of discussions at a recent meeting, our club has set up a Club Plates Committee to consider these issues. That committee and Executive held a meeting recently to decide on improving our system. Originally we thought the committee members could inspect cars but that places a lot of time and travel on them and was not really workable and also would be unworkable as to what is original on every make and model of car on club plates in our club.


The solution from that meeting was to put that responsibility on the members to provide a statement and three photos of their car as part

of the Club's Historic Plates Scheme. The Club will require members to submit three photos to the Club as part of the process and these will be kept on the Club's website but will be password protected to just Committee members. The photos are to be taken looking at the engine bay, a three quarter shot coving the front and the side and a rear shot. These can be done on most phones and sent to the Club before the Registration Day, usually in December. The website is being looked at to see if it has the capacity to do this. Also there will be sample photos to give members an idea of the pictures required. If there are problems, ask the grandkids for assistance! There will be more on this as the system is put in place over the next month. The forms have been developed so can be loaded to the Club website in preparation.

The Club Plates Scheme is a great benefit to our members so please try to comply with the rules to keep our club name respected and keep the Department of Transport happy with scheme as well as local Police. Any concerns over members breaching the rules can be passed on to the Committee and members of the Plates Committee can look at the issue.










Ford Speedster with Frontenac cylinder head built by Bruce Watson senior in the mid 1930s.

CLUB RUN RECIPE CRAIG'S FAMOUS RASPBERRY WHITE CHOCOLATE CHEESECAKE



1 packet + 4 scotch finger biscuits
90g unsalted butter (melted)
500g Philadelphia cream cheese (softened)
220g white chocolate (save some for garnishing over raspberries)

- 34 cup of caster sugar
- 1 lemon (for rind and juice)
- 1 cup thickened cream
- 4 level teaspoons of gelatine dissolved into ¼ cup boiling water (add when cool)
- 2 punnets raspberries (cut in halves) save ½ punnet for garnishing

Crush scotch finger biscuits and add melted butter and press into a 240mm greased springform pan to form base, place in fridge to set. Boil water, add gelatine and allow to cool.

Slowly melt white chocolate in microwave. Beat the softened cream cheese, sugar and lemon iuice and rind until smooth

Add raspberries to mixture and fold in with wooden spoon


Remove base from fridge and pour mixture in. Put cheesecake back into fridge to set for 3 hours Before serving, slice remaining ½ punnet raspberries in halves and place in a pattern on top and finely grate white chocolate blocks over for garnishing





It is your steering committee's intention to produce this brief note immediately after general meetings and to mail it to all financial members. In this way, timely information will get to all. As you will see the newsheet can be prepared and distributed quickly without the hassles and delays in producing a magazine.

The note will be limited to one foolscap page. It will contain a brief summary of information made available and decisions taken at the last meeting, club's bank balance, a list of new members and significant news about existing members, full details about immediately forthcoming events, dates of later events and members' ads (for sale, wanted and for exchange).

Here goes.

The second meeting to form the Club was held at Ballina Golf Club on Wed Jan. 21, 1981. There were 23 persons present.

Preliminary decisions taken for incorporation in the Club's constitution were:

- that the Club be known as the Ballina Districts Vehicle Restorers' Club.
- that there be only one category of member; eligibility to be defined in terms of interest in vehicle restoration and preservation not ownership of a vehicle; membership to be on a family basis.
- that vehicles manufactured up to 31.12.55 be eligible to enter club events.
- enter club events.

 that club plates (when and if we receive approval to issue them) be available to members with cars eligible under rules laid down by Department of Motor Transport (i.e. for cars up to a date in the mid 40's, we think).

Geoff Wiseman reported a bank balance of \$70 (14 x \$5 donations; no expenses paid).

The next general meeting will be at Ballina Golf Club at 8.00 p.m. on 4.3.81.

Our first family outing will be to Lennox Head on 22.2.81. You don't need a restored car. Meet at the southern approach to Missingham Bridge in time to depart at 11.00 a.m. Take your own tucker (B-B-Q's available). Take cricket bats, footballs, etc. If you miss the convoy meet up with the rest near Lake Ainsworth just before the entrance to the fitness camp. Les Mahony will lead the convoy - if you want more information contact him on 86 2935.

The following outing will be to the Everglades on 22.3.81.
