





Old Age and Driving







Due to their physical frailty, older drivers are more likely to be injured in an accident. A senior citizen is more likely than a younger driver to be at fault in an accident in which they are involved. The common violations include failure to obey traffic signals, unsafe turns and passing and failure to yield right of way.

Physical strength, mental acuity and overall health can begin to deteriorate as a person ages and they may not even be aware it is happening. It is important to communicate to older drivers the importance of safety when operating a motor vehicle. Often, family members of an elderly person, such as one's children, are faced with the responsibility of trying to get them to give up driving. This can be challenging because few senior citizens are voluntarily willing to give up their own car keys. Some places require persons above a specified age to take certain tests when renewing their licences, including a road test, or to receive a medical certificate stating they are medically fit to operate a motor vehicle.

In Queensland everyone 75 and over who holds a Queensland driver licence must carry a current medical certificate. QMR

How age affects your driving:

Vision: As you age it can become more difficult to:

- Change focus and see detail (traffic signs)
- See obstacles such as pedestrians and cyclists
- Deal with and recover from glare of oncoming headlights or afternoon sun
- See things in your side vision
- Adjust your vision when going from light to dark and vice versa

Medical conditions such as cataracts, glaucoma and diabetes can also affect your vision.

To maintain your Vision:

- Have your eyes checked regularly
- Keep the prescription for your glasses up to date
- Modify your driving patterns (limiting your driving or avoiding driving at night)
- Keep your windscreen clean at all times

Movement: Changes to your body can make movement slower and more difficult. You may have a decrease in your:

- Muscle strength
- Flexibility and mobility
- Range of movement
- Coordination

These changes, plus common health problems like arthritis can affect the way you drive. You may find it harder to operate gears and clutch which can result in slower reaction times.





My First Car – Ken and Ann Gehrke – North Ipswich

In 1939, my parents bought a 1930 Model A Ford and 'she' affectionately became known at 'Beaut'. Beaut was the family car until 1954, when she was passed on to my sister and then to me in 1958, when I acquired my licence. My dad, Percy had taught me to drive Beaut when I was 12. When I was about 16, dad had a run in with a cow which pinned him to the fence and he had to spend time at Laidley hospital. I was a student at Ipswich Grammar School and was boarding in town but I had to go home each day to milk the cows. How did I get to school? Of course I drove the Ford from Mt Mort to Ipswich every day for five weeks. How good was that! However after rain, the roads turned to mud. I would always drive through puddles and water would fly up through the floorboards. If we became bogged, I would engage the hand throttle and get out beside the car and push. When traction was gained, I would spring onto the running board and back into the car.

I met Ann Ford and Beaut became my courting car. Once we were travelling back to Ipswich after a night out in Brisbane. Beaut ran out of petrol at Riverview. I forgot to turn off the tap and as it was gravity feed, fuel had been lost. I gave Ann the crank handle for protection while I walked to Noble's Garage at Dinmore for petrol.

When I was 17, I painted the car Kentucky Blue with red trim. Beaut rested under dad's house for a couple of decades and after the motor was restored and a paint touchup, we were off to the Merryvale School Centenary celebrations at the Rosevale Pub Hall. Merryvale was a property taken up by the Murray family in 1890 and a school was set up. It closed and reopened a number of times and at one stage Perc and Grace Gehrke boarded three teachers at 'Cardross'. It finally closed in 1961. My sister and I went to Merryvale School. My family enjoyed the celebrations on 12th September, 1992. There was a Grand Dance at night.



The Model of a Family Car - 1929 Model A Ford

Brothers Bill and Lindsay Brodie and their 1929 Model A Ford must surely be Guinness Book of Records material. Their father bought the car new in 1930 and it was the only car he owned. The brothers still drive it and it's the only car they've owned.

The old soft-top Ford has never been off the road - apart for repairs - in nearly 75 years, and its black-and-white number plates are the ones it was issued with. Its four-cylinder engine (it's been done up, of course) still ticks over like a clock, and the speedo shows 55,198 miles (about 88,832 km).

"But it's done 255,198 miles (nearly 411,000 km). That's the third time around," says Lindsay. "I think the cable broke once or twice and we put another one in."

Lindsay, who's nudging 80, backs the car out of the old timber garage the brothers built for it nearly 60 years ago and the pair proudly point out its finest features. "The hood's been done three times, but that (the one on it) has been on for the best part of 20 years," says Lindsay, tapping the well-kept black top. Its blue vinyl seats have been reupholstered, but that was a while ago, too.

Bill, 87 in January, opens one of the back doors. The door panel is unmistakably original. "It's a bit knocked about. We've had sookie calves in there (poddy calves they've taken to market in the car). But I think a bull or something did that," says Lindsay, referring to a hole in the door panel.

Lindsay lifts the bonnet to show off its "pretty simple" engine, then points to the nickel-plated radiator and headlights. "Nothing's ever been done to that. That's all original. And that's the old tooter," he says, tapping the klaxon horn next to the radiator.

The brothers maintain the car themselves. If it needs a new clutch, they put one in. "We know all about those fellas," says Bill. They even keep a spare motor - just in case.

Bill climbs into the car and scrabbles around under the back seat, emerging with "the original old starting handle" that came with the car. It was a wine colour new but their father repainted it royal blue and black. The brothers have repainted it twice since, the first time with a brush. "It wasn't too good," says Lindsay. Next time they used a spray gun.

Lindsay points to the bare-metal running board; it used to have rubber on it but the calves

chewed it off. "They (the calves) survived," quips Bill. Lindsay opens the driver's door and puts his arm through a flap in the side curtain. "Years ago you put your hand out here to go around a corner."

But that's been unnecessary since they fitted indicators. They also added longer rear-vision mirrors they made on their lathe.

We climb aboard, mostly to get out of the wind blowing across their Western District dairy farm. Lindsay flicks a small toggle switch and grins and on comes a radio, deep under the dash, tuned to the ABC.

It is here they also tell of childhood days in the back seat of the Ford when they went shopping and also "to the beach at different times". The top used to go down, but that's since been welded shut.

Bill doesn't remember his father bringing the car home but Lindsay recalls as a six-year-old being fascinated by the shiny headlights. "You could see yourself. It was just like a mirror."

Both brothers got their driver's licence in the car. They have known no other form of motoring. Except, perhaps, for the tractor. They built that out of another Model A in the 1950s. It has an Model A front end, engine and chassis, the back end's off a Bren-gun carrier, and it's got everything from a power take-off to a generator big enough to run the lights in the milking shed if the power fails.

The brothers still milk 20 cows a day, and if something needs fixing they've got the mobile electric welder they built, also from an Model A engine and parts. "We've got a lathe in here," says Bill, opening a shed to reveal a huge factory lathe amid the clutter.

Back in the farmhouse, Bill takes two trophies from the mantelpiece engraved "Best Feral Ute", awarded to their tractor at the Koroit show in 1998 and in 2002. They're proud of that. Bill then scratches around in a bedroom drawer, returning with a neatly folded receipt dated July 1, 1930, for "one only Ford Phaeton (Sports model)", made out to Mr Wm Brodie for £Â£210 cash.

The Brodie boys have never married and "don't drink or smoke", volunteers Bill. They don't watch TV, either. The TV "went bung two or three years ago," says Lindsay. "Now we don't bother about it."

The brothers used to take the cattle to the market in a trailer behind the car, but they use the tractor now. It's registered and still with its black-and-white plates.

Like its owners, the old Model A is in remarkable shape but it's caused the odd hiccup. Like the time they got stuck "in the bottom paddock" with a flat battery. Wasn't even enough spark to crank-start it. Lindsay tells how he pulled the belt off the generator, put a rope around it and pulled it "just like a motor mower", creating the spark while Bill cranked the old car into action.

That's farming ingenuity for you.

AUTOBIOGRAPHY: The Model A rolled off the production line on 20 October 1927, replacing the Model T, built since 1908. Henry Ford is believed to have spent US \$1 million designing and retooling his plant to produce the Model A and the changes were extensive. The Model T had two-wheel brakes and a two-speed, pedal-operated planetary transmission, but the Model A came with a three-speed, lever-operated sliding gear, complete with clutch and four-wheel mechanical brakes. Six body styles were offered – Roadster, Coupe, Tudor, four-door sedan and ute – with a Phaeton as top of the range. In 1932 the Model A was replaced by the Model B with a V8 engine.

ROSEWOOD GARAGES

The Embassy Service Station was built about 1963

My parents, Bob and Leila Park owned the Blacksmiths Shop at the intersection of John and William Streets in Rosewood. Around about 1961 they were approached by a couple of reps from the Caltex Fuel Company. They were inquiring about who owned the land over the road from the blacksmiths. My father asked the reason why they wanted to know. They introduced themselves and explained that they thought it would be an ideal site for a service station. Mum and Dad informed them that they were the owners of the block and they were agreeable to the terms of building a service station on this land. The Embassy Service Station was built during 1963.

Soon after the opening of the service station, John Zupp and his Sales Manager, Dave Rennie approached my parents and after terms were agreed to, the Embassy Service Station was now selling Zupps new and used cars. Bulk fuel sales, car servicing and repairs and car sales were all going strong. Mum and Dad were still running the Blacksmiths shop and due to an impossible workload, they finally sold the Blacksmiths shop to Bill Gordon from Lowood.

Bob and Leila had three children, Graeme, Gloria and Allan. The three of us along with other teenagers formed the Rosewood GT Auto Club. IVVVC member, Kev Dale was an original member of that Rosewood Car Club and was proudly driving cruisers in his Mk 1 Zephyr.

My first car was an FC Holden which I acquired when I was 16. I took the motor apart but when I had some nuts and bolts left over after I reassembled it, my father suggested that I do it again and find where these extra bits should go.

Due to ill health of both Bob and Leila, The Embassy Service Station was sold. I am proud to say the service station is still operating today.






The Service Station today



PICNIC IN THE PARK


SUNDAY 19th MAY 2019 CAMERON PARK – IPSWICH


