

Adler

The Story Behind Car Badges Taken from the book 'Car Badges of the World' published in 1970. Last month was the story of the AC badge and this month the story of the Adler badge. As space permits each month these will be printed in the magazine in alphabetical order.

Heinrich Kleyer began making his Adler bicycles in Frankfurt in 1886. He turned to cars in 1899, like so many German manufacturers taking up a French licence; in his case that of De Dion Bouton. Motor cycles were also made, as well as typewriters and aero engines. As the first decade of the new century wore on, Adler became best known for big, powerful cars of conventional design. Only one Adler was a notable exception in this period: the engineer Edmund Rumpler, later to be famous, in 1903 designed one with swing-axle independent suspension and unit construction of engine and gearbox. Production models were unexciting enough, until the arrival of the Trumpf model of 1932, with front wheel drive and independent suspension, designed by H. G. Rohr. The emblem, shown here, is a very stylised eagle – Adler in German means eagle.

Glencoe Bowser and Lunch Run

Sunday 21st July 2019 Hosted by Dave Carey.

One could've been excused for thinking it was already Spring when twenty -seven members in thirteen historic vehicles set off for a visit to John and Josie Ellis's petrol bowser collection at Glencoe on Sunday 21st July as brilliant sunshine beamed down from a blue sky with a scattering of fluffy white clouds. The trip was only marred by the sorry sight of an extremely thirsty dry land crying out for a downpour. At Glencoe we regrouped and were joined by John Gow in his modern car.

On arrival at our destination we were met with the warmest welcome possible by John and Josie who ushered us into a beautiful enclosed entertainment area where tables, chairs, a boiling urn and everything necessary for a cuppa was waiting. Morning tea over and time to move onto the sheds.

The doors of the first shed were opened and I thought WOW! It was like we had entered petrol bowser heaven and, after entering the second shed, I began to think we really were. Both sheds were packed to the rafters with petrol bowsers, oil tins, enamel signs and garagenalia. Mostly meticulously restored, some in original condition, all arranged perfectly on display and spotlessly clean and not a speck of dust in sight.

My childhood memories came flooding back to the days when Dad drove into the petrol station, pulled up beside the bowser and remained in the car as a usually smiling attendant pumped the required amount of petrol into the tank, checked your oil and tyres if requested, cleaned the windscreen, took the money then returned with any change before wishing you a safe journey. Nowadays we do it all ourselves, walk into the shop to pay and the shop attendant says, "Which bowser? Put your card in then enter pin. Remove card. Thank-you, have a nice day". My, how things have changed.

John explained the difference to me between the old American and Australian petrol bowsers with the glass collection tanks on top. In the Australian bowsers, petrol was measured in half gallon increments to one gallon. Thereafter, in gallon increments ascending to a maximum of five gallons. The American petrol bowsers measured in one gallon increments descending to a maximum of ten gallons, made possible by a floating tube which moved downwards as petrol flowed in displaying the amount on a gauge. Josie said the ninety—eight bowsers in the collection come from France, England, America, New Zealand and Australia. The oldest is a 1903 Gilbarco petrol bowser where the petrol was hand pumped from an underground tank. There was even one of Australia's oldest Kerosene Bowsers, an Atlantic produced by Gilbarco. The Australian Stockman was a very interesting bowser with an honesty sheet on which the customer would enter all necessary details after pumping his own petrol. This was later added to the customer's account. Talk about trust. It certainly would not happen in today's society.

As I wandered through this mind-boggling collection, old advertising slogans began running through my head. Remember the days when: Ampol was 'As Australian as Caltex' and 'With You All The Way', but 'Golden Fleece Gave You More Smiles To The Gallon' while BP which was 'Beyond Petroleum' also gave you 'Zoom' only to be outdone by Esso who 'Put A Tiger In Your Tank' and you 'Went Well With Shell', but I'm 'Going, Going, Amocoing' with Amoco while 'Trusting My Car To The Man Who Wears The Star' at Caltex.

Being a collector himself Frosty thought that the small Michelin Man air compressor was simply magic, but was over the moon to see one of his favourite signs, the Phillips 66 sign hanging from the ceiling.

Time to move back inside for lunch, overlooking parched grazing land and imagining what a difference good rainfall would make. Dave presented John and Josie with our mugs in appreciation of their hospitality before we headed home via Ben Lomond with a few also dropping off for afternoon tea at Dumaresq Dam.

On behalf of all members who attended, I extend our appreciation and thanks to you, Dave, for organising such a great day. I left feeling as if I have made two friends for years to come.

Wauchope Trucks of Yesteryear Run Friday 12th July to Sunday 14th July.

Friday after lunch Frosty & myself travelling in the Crown met with Judi & Col Pearce, who chose to take the Subaru for a run, at the Arboretum. We then headed to Walcha to meet with Beryl & Peter Dunn, who took their Jaguar, on our way to Wauchope for Wauchope Trucks of Yesteryear Run.

The drive down the Oxley Highway was very enjoyable as usual for me and, as always, I took the opportunity to show off the historic Kindee Bridge. The bridge is of single span cable truss suspension construction with a ten-ton load limit which only allows 1 vehicle at a time to cross. After crossing into Kindee we all decided that this was a good spot for afternoon tea. A huge road roller came from out of the hills & waited for a couple of cars to cross the bridge and then proceeded to cross as well. We watched in horror as the cable trusses stretched to what seemed like the limit as the whole bridge trembled sideways. Long Flat was our nature stop and then onto Wauchope. On Saturday morning Peter Chambers caught the train to Walcha Road where his brother Rod met him & they then travelled to Wauchope in Rod's Landcruiser, arriving around lunchtime. The Trucks of Yesteryear display was an absolutely amazing sight to see. The oldest truck was a 1919 Bulldog Mack with solid rubber tyres. Trucks ranged from those in original condition to those which were fully restored to working trucks. The sun shining down on those richly adorned with chrome & highly polished made a dazzling display, which had to be seen to be believed. I certainly cannot remember my father's log trucks & flat tops ever gleaming like the working trucks proudly dis-

There was about 74 historic vehicles on display, consisting of cars & utes from various car clubs along the Beechwood Road side of the show ring with trucks filling the rest. In my estimation there would have been over 100 trucks, not including those on the backs of others. Tractors & motor bikes of various types were displayed outside the ring. The Grand Parade was well worth watching, if only to see the old retirees purring along. This was an absolutely magic day out, catching up with fellow club members and browsing the junk stalls was the icing on the cake.

After lunch Frosty & I took Judi & Col out to visit a friend of ours who said he had a really good Toyota that Frosty would be interested in for \$200, but after searching through rubbish in his Toyota Graveyard it was found to be a tad too rusty. Unfortunately, Beryl & Peter had things to attend to in Port & missed this visit. We then visited my sister Judy for afternoon tea.

On Sunday morning we headed for the Cowarra Dam at King Creek in the Cowarra State Forest which is the water supply to Wauchope, Camden Haven & Port Macquarie areas. The dam has a capacity of 10,000 million litres. Water needed to fill the dam is pumped from the Hastings River at Koree Island west of Wauchope. We then travelled on through King Creek onto Bago Road to the 'Old Bottlebutt', a grand & ancient Red Bloodwood (Corymbia-Gummifera) tree located in The Burrawan State Forest. Old Bottlebutt is unique in its shape with a large flared "butt" having a massive girth of more than 16 metres just above its base. At over 200 years old, 'Old Bottlebutt' towers above the forest canopy. The forest walk was thoroughly enjoyed by us all, with boardwalks & steps dispersed along the track making walking easier. Col, Frosty & Peter would like to have you believe that Judi & I got us all lost in the myriad of pathways, but the truth is that we just simply couldn't decide which path to take. Vale the Volkswagen Beetle

On Wednesday 10th July the final VW Beetle rolled off the production line Mexico, marking the end of the Beetle's history covering eight decades from 1938. Ferdinand Porsche designed what became known as the Beetle in response Hitler's desire for a German 'people's car' or Volkswagen.

Following WWII a 'civilianised' version of the Volkswagen was re-launched under the supervision of the British Occupation Forces. Some years later in 1949 the VW factory was transferred to the German Government and the State of Lower Saxony, which is still a part owner of VW.

By the end of 1955 the 1,000,000th Beetle (Type 1) had been produced. The USA became the largest foreign Beetle market, with imports reaching a peak of 563,522 in 1968 (40% of total production that year). The introduction of the VW Golf in 1978 saw the end of Beetle production in Wolfsburg. This was not the end of the Beetle however, with their manufacture in Brazil continuing up to 1986 and then again, with government support, from 1993-1996. The Beetle also lived on in Mexico from 1967 until 2003, longer that its production run in Germany.

In 1998 the New Beetle was introduced as a completely new retro version built on a modified Golf platform, reprising some of the original Beetle's cuteness. But now, the very last of the latest, modernised, Beetle 'Final Edition', was completed at the VW plant in Cuautlancingo, Puebla Mexico in June and thus the production of VW Beetles of all types has ceased.

Membership Application Process

People intending to become members of the CSCCNNSW are required to attend a General Meeting of the Club and introduce themselves to the Membership Officer and collect an Application Form and a copy of the Constitution. They are also required to introduce themselves to the Club. The Application Form will not be accepted at this meeting.

Applicants are to submit their completed Application Form at the next meeting. It **MUST** be signed by the applicant, or the Application will be rejected. The Application will be approved/not approved by the Committee, may take a couple of months. The Membership Officer will then notify the applicant.

Once the applicant has been accepted they are to pay the equivalent of 3 years subscription within 28 days of being notified of their acceptance. Failure to pay within the stated period will result in forfeiture of the application. An additional \$20 per year is payable for a printed magazine.

Historic Vehicle Registration will only be available three (3) months after payment of their fees.

HVS Registration Procedure

You MUST be a financial member of the CSCCNNSW.

Only unmodified vehicles eligible for the existing scheme can be registered in this scheme.

For ALL new registrations, irrespective of whether a vehicle has a current Pink Slip roadworthy certificate, all vehicles are required to be inspected by the CSCC Registration Officer, or Assistant Registration Officer, before the RMS Historic Vehicle Declaration (Form 1259) will be stamped and signed. You cannot renew registration at a RMS office unless the form bears the Club Seal and Registrar's signature.

All historic vehicles registered by members of the CSCC are required to have a current comprehensive insurance policy which must be shown to the Registrar. You must also show your current Club Membership card.

Once all the above have been completed, submit the registration certificate, RMS Historic Vehicle Declaration form and payment to a Roads and Maritime Services or Service NSW office. When doing so you have the option to have a log book (at no extra cost) for usage outside Club events

When your Vehicle has been passed for registration by RMS you MUST inform the CSCC Registrar, or Assistant Registrar, of the Plate Number, if you are on the logbook and any other changes to your Registration.

HVS Usage Rules

For owners of vehicles with Conditional Registration:

A Movement Permit must be obtained from the Club Movement Officer and carried for any non-club approved movement, where the member is **NOT** a participant in the Logbook Scheme;

Movement Officer will document and give verbal approval for maintenance runs in excess of 30 km radius from their place of residence, where the member is **NOT** a participant in the Logbook Scheme;

Must observe all RMS and national road rules and regulations;

Members are not liable for any infringement notices or fines incurred by another person in control of their conditionally registered vehicle provided such use is in accordance with this clause and the member indemnifies the Club from any and all liability which may arise as a result of such usage;

Members on the Logbook Scheme are required to complete the logbook for each usage that is not a Club Run. This includes ALL Maintenance Runs regardless of distance;

It is a requirement by Law that you Carry the Purple Card Issued by RMS, Your Log Book and /or Proof of a Club Event in the Vehicle at all times;

Caution needs to be exercised when leaving a vehicle with an outside workshop for work. If the mechanic is to test drive the vehicle he must make a log book entry. Only one log book entry needs to be made for each day, but a separate signature is required by every person who drives the vehicle on that day.

Any member may bring to the attention of the Executive an alleged misuse of Conditionally Registered Vehicle by a member of the Club, but such notification must be in writing and signed by the member making the allegation.

In the case of apparent misuse of a Conditionally Registered vehicle

the owner will first be asked by the Executive to explain the misuse;

after consultation the Executive will formally remind the owner of the RMS rules and regulations for Conditional Registration; and

the Executive will report back to the next <u>General</u> Meeting and either recommend no further action or some form of disciplinary action to be taken;

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
