Simply it is the best way to keep the entrants from heading off to find their own way to the destinations. Following the leader and listening on Channel 13 worked very well with the whole group arriving every time. Twelve cars carrying twenty-two enthusiasts lined up at 7:00 am on Sunday November 3rd to begin the "Mystery".

DAY 1: Destination - Esk in Q'land-distance 530 Kms. First comfort stop: Glen Innes then on to Yarrow-ford Picnic Area for morning tea-on through Warwick-back road to Allora for lunch. North toward Too-woomba before turning right on the Gatton/Esk scenic road to our destination. Motel for the next three nights is Brisbane Valley Rail Trail Motel. Happy hour and car talk before Lyn prepared a home-made Pizza dinner for us all. I'm not a Pizza lover, but these were good.

DAY 2: 9:30am Muster- off to the village of Somerset Dam for a stroll before seeing lots of water and enjoying a picnic lunch while watching thousands of cormorants fishing from the Dam. After our second happy hour we adjourned to The Grand Hotel for dinner.

DAY 3: Muster tells us we are on a 100km run to Toogoolawah for morning tea before we travel west to Blackbutt, home to the highly awarded Blackbutt Pie. After sampling the renowned product, we headed back to Esk for the traditional Happy Hour. Dinner was at The Grand Hotel.

DAY 4: Muster at 8:30 where Mick tells us that we will be shifting motels today while visiting Fernvale, Marburg, Rosewood, Tallegalla, Minden, Plainland and Gatton. Our first stop was to visit the magnificent Homestead of Woodlands where we were given a tour of the historic building and grounds. Although built as a private residence (with no expense spared) the building has had several owners, including some monks who hand dug a magnificent Olympic swimming pool. We were provided with a beautiful morning tea of scones, jam and cream by the staff. Our accommodation for the next three nights was The Gatton Motel. After happy hour we had dinner at the Royal Hotel.

On our return to Gatton we visited the Q'land Transport Museum.

DAY 6: After a 9:00 am Mick led us to Pohlman's Nursery to enjoy a train tour of maybe the biggest plant nursery in the Southern Hemisphere. The 150 employee nursery raises garden plants for 1000 customers who retail the plants to gardeners who have the luxury of water. After a delightful morning tea in the shade of hanging plants we returned to Gatton for an easy afternoon. Some visited the Truck Drivers Memorial and were staggered by the number of plaques in memory of the truckies who have lost their lives on the job.

Some adventurous folk could not resist the opportunity to travel the Toowoomba Bypass which is a magnificent piece of road construction.

DAY 7: Home day (or so we thought). We moved off on our way to Warwick for morning tea aware that we were to meet the Armidale contingent who were travelling north to join us for lunch and a visit to Hillier's Motor Works. We were pleased to meet with six cars from home before Gavin Hillier generously gave of his time to explain their part in the distribution of hearses to undertakers. This was a most enjoyable visit by those with engineering appreciation, especially Ross Campbell who had travelled with Peter Ducat to view the specialised workshop.

THEN THE WHEELS FELL OFF: THE HIGHWAY WAS CLOSED AT BOLIVIA HILL.

Some travelled home via Bonshaw and Inverell while others decided to extend the LONG RUN by another day.



The next Hub Rally is at Tamworth so mark your calendar for next October and an expansion of your horizon.



Scotland no longer produces its own breed of car, but in the past there have been more than fifty, and of these at least three were well known Arrol-Johnston, Albion and Argyll. Argyll was the most famous. The name was devised by Alexander Govan, the company's founder. In the days before the First World War, it was at one time the fifth biggest car manufacturer in Britain. For a spell, around 1907, Argyll were making cars faster than any other manufacturer in Britain. The badge illustrated contains a red lion and a thistle, both features of the Royal Arms of Scotland, and for some reason a rose. Alexandria was the location of the factory opened in 1906. This badge was used on certain models between 1912 and 1922. Argyll manufactured cars from 1899 to 1932. From 'Car Badges of the World'

Membership Application Process

People intending to become members of the CSCCNNSW are required to attend a General Meeting of the Club and introduce themselves to the Membership Officer and collect an Application Form and a copy of the Constitution. They are also required to introduce themselves to the Club. The Application Form will not be accepted at this meeting.

Applicants are to submit their completed Application Form at the next meeting. It **MUST** be signed by the applicant, or the Application will be rejected. The Application will be approved/not approved by the Committee, may take a couple of months. The Membership Officer will then notify the applicant.

Once the applicant has been accepted they are to pay the equivalent of 3 years subscription within 28 days of being notified of their acceptance. Failure to pay within the stated period will result in forfeiture of the application. An additional \$20 per year is payable for a printed magazine.

Historic Vehicle Registration will only be available three (3) months after payment of their fees.

HVS Registration Procedure

You MUST be a financial member of the CSCCNNSW.

Only unmodified vehicles eligible for the existing scheme can be registered in this scheme.

For ALL new registrations, irrespective of whether a vehicle has a current Pink Slip roadworthy certificate, all vehicles are required to be inspected by the CSCC Registration Officer, or Assistant Registration Officer, before the RMS Historic Vehicle Declaration (Form 1259) will be stamped and signed. You cannot renew registration at a RMS office unless the form bears the Club Seal and Registrar's signature.

All historic vehicles registered by members of the CSCC are required to have a current comprehensive insurance policy which must be shown to the Registrar. You must also show your current Club Membership card.

Once all the above have been completed, submit the registration certificate, RMS Historic Vehicle Declaration form and payment to a Roads and Maritime Services or Service NSW office. When doing so you have the option to have a log book (at no extra cost) for usage outside Club events

When your Vehicle has been passed for registration by RMS you **MUST** inform the CSCC Registrar, or Assistant Registrar, of the Plate Number, if you are on the logbook and any other changes to your Registration.

HVS Usage Rules

For owners of vehicles with Conditional Registration:

A Movement Permit must be obtained from the Club Movement Officer and carried for any non-club approved movement, where the member is **NOT** a participant in the Logbook Scheme;

Movement Officer will document and give verbal approval for maintenance runs in excess of 30 km radius from their place of residence, where the member is **NOT** a participant in the Logbook Scheme;

Must observe all RMS and national road rules and regulations;

Members are not liable for any infringement notices or fines incurred by another person in control of their conditionally registered vehicle provided such use is in accordance with this clause and the member indemnifies the Club from any and all liability which may arise as a result of such usage;

Members on the Logbook Scheme are required to complete the logbook for each usage that is not a Club Run. This includes ALL Maintenance Runs regardless of distance;

It is a requirement by Law that you Carry the Purple Card Issued by RMS, Your Log Book and /or Proof of a Club Event in the Vehicle at all times;

Caution needs to be exercised when leaving a vehicle with an outside workshop for work. If the mechanic is to test drive the vehicle he must make a log book entry. Only one log book entry needs to be made for each day, but a separate signature is required by every person who drives the vehicle on that day.

Any member may bring to the attention of the Executive an alleged misuse of Conditionally Registered Vehicle by a member of the Club, but such notification must be in writing and signed by the member making the allegation.

In the case of apparent misuse of a Conditionally Registered vehicle

the owner will first be asked by the Executive to explain the misuse;

after consultation the Executive will formally remind the owner of the RMS rules and regulations for Conditional Registration; and

the Executive will report back to the next <u>General</u> Meeting and either recommend no further action or some form of disciplinary action to be taken;
